# \$45,000 Grant from The Bernardine Franciscan Sisters Foundation; Sensory Table for Early Intervention Program

he three-year, \$45,000 grant from The Bernardine
Franciscan Sisters Foundation (BFSF) will continue to
support the Home's Early Intervention (EI) program,
which is approaching the end of its inaugural year. The program
is currently funded in part by Portsmouth General Hospital
Foundation and The VuBay Foundation, Hampton, Virginia.

This grant ensures the continuation of a program that has become vital to the youngest residents at the Home. This additional funding will directly support the purchase of equipment, materials and other educational resources to be used by the students, staff and families who participate in the El program.




