Celebrating St. Mary's past, present and future

The year 2010 brought several reasons to celebrate St. Mary's past and present, and to look forward to our future. We commemorated 65 years of caring for children in Virginia. And we celebrated five rewarding years in our current facility, which opened in large part because of those in the community, like you, who have generously given support through the years.

On March 24, 2010, we hosted a sold-out event that recognized the long history of St. Mary's Home and its role in the history of Norfolk and

the Hampton Roads area. Our sponsors that evening were: presenting sponsor Monarch Bank, Campostella Builders, Sentara and Wells Fargo Advisors. In the founding years, St. Mary's provided a home for children whose families were unable to care for them. Today, we care for up to 92 children who have multiple, severe disabilities.

Toward the end of 2010, the Board of Trustees, during Rick Knapp's tenure as president, made a decision to launch St. Mary's Home into the next phase of our mission: caring for adults. Now, in gratitude to Carl and Carole Anne Albero for their lead gift, and to all of our donors so far, we will open a wing in 2012 that will provide to adults a

level of care exemplifying our mission to help all residents reach their full potential. The *Embrace* Campaign is well underway. We project that by the end of 2011, with the help of a dedicated team of trustees, campaign cabinet members and generous donors like you, we will reach the \$3 million needed to complete the new wing. We hope you will find that you, too, can take part in this new phase of St. Mary's mission.

St. Mary's Home: room to grow

The world was at war in December 1944 when what was then St. Mary's Infant Home opened in a renovated century-old building to care for abandoned and orphaned children in Norfolk. St. Mary's has been growing and changing ever since. And we're about to grow again.

In 2010, St. Mary's Home for Disabled Children celebrated 65 years of caring for children – of cherishing each young person who comes here as an individual to be respected, listened to and loved.

For many years, nuns from the Roman Catholic religious order the Daughters of Wisdom managed the Home. Sister Mary June Morin, the last Daughter of Wisdom at St. Mary's, retired in early 2011 after 51 years of service, but still comes to the Home regularly to volunteer and see the children.

By the 1950s, St. Mary's had already begun to evolve by caring for children with disabilities. The next decade, St. Mary's built and moved into a 50-bed nursing facility specializing in residential care for children with more severe intellectual disabilities at a time when there weren't many such places.

By the 1980s, the Home had evolved into the place it is today: a private, nonprofit, nonsectarian organization that provides expert around-the-clock care for children with severe physical and intellectual disabilities.

In 2005, St. Mary's current building opened near Sentara Leigh Hospital. Since moving to the new Home, the children have spent 25 percent fewer days out at the hospital. The excellent care and caring they receive at St. Mary's is key, and the bright and beautiful building with more space and the latest systems contributes to that care.

Through the years, the number of children that St. Mary's cares for has grown, from a dozen to as many as 92. The age limit has grown, too, from 6 years to 21. And now, after more than six decades of helping children, St. Mary's is getting ready to

help adults as well, with an expansion expected to open in 2012. Take a look through this report to learn more about that project and other happenings at St. Mary's Home made possible through the generosity of donors like you.

What St. Mary's offers

Children and young adults from across Virginia who have severe intellectual and physical disabilities live, play and go to school at St. Mary's Home, a national leader in pediatric long-term care. We also can help children who need respite, or short-stay, care, perhaps because

of a family emergency or surgery requiring intensive post-operative physical therapy.

Nursing staff provide professional, 24-hour clinical care, and nearly 20 specialists from Children's Hospital of the King's Daughters and Eastern Virginia Medical School routinely come to the Home to see the children. The children have regular physical therapy, and occupational therapy staff fit the children for splints to keep their limbs in alignment and customize and maintain their wheelchairs and other equipment. The dietary service department prepares and delivers all meals based on physician-approved diets overseen by a registered dietitian. Support coordinators meet with the children, parents or guardians and staff to make sure the children receive appropriate services based on their individual needs.

The children also enjoy many activities both at the Home and in the community, from swimming in the Home's therapy pool to taking field trips to the beach, the library or a museum, supervised by the recreational therapy and activities staffs.

Learning and being loved

When Candace Duffoure looked at her son Jaime's worksheet, she cried. Not because he had received a C but because this was the first time that Jaime had ever received grades in school. He's 16.

To his mother, that grade was proof of something she had always known: He can learn.

Jaime came to St. Mary's Home in 2010 for post-surgical rehabilitation. His family decided to keep him at St. Mary's when they saw how much he was benefiting from life here, where he receives regular physical therapy and around-the-clock nursing care the Home provides.

St. Mary's also makes sure that every child, no matter how medically fragile, attends school. If families prefer, their children go to classes at public schools in Norfolk and Virginia Beach. Many children, like Jaime, stay at St. Mary's, which partners with Southeastern Cooperative Educational Programs to provide instruction by licensed, master's-prepared educators.

Academic skills are a mandatory part of the state curriculum. SECEP also focuses on communication and functional life skills, such as helping the children learn to call for attention or make choices by pressing buttons on their wheelchair trays. The children continue to go to school, part time, during the summer to reinforce concepts and skills learned.

At St. Mary's, Jaime is doing simple addition problems, when the only math he did before was simple counting. He also works on big long-term projects, such as creating a display of the solar system for SECEP's science fair.

"Jaime's learning to participate, to be part of something," his mother said. "He's learning patience, to take turns. Plus, he's being loved to death."

"We have so much fun at our prom, we thought they should have that fun, too," said Carter McCabe, co-president of Norfolk Academy's St. Mary's Club. Special thanks go to St. Mary's Auxiliary Board for paying for tuxedo rentals, the DJ and flowers.



The Power Of Touch

A look back at some of what made the year 2010 special.

St. Mary's employees took up a collection and raised \$1,705 to send to the Daughters of Wisdom to use for their Haiti relief efforts. Nuns from the Catholic religious order ran St. Mary's for many years. The amount raised included \$450 from a Valentine's goodie sale/baked goods raffle organized by the Nurses Environmental Committee, which focuses on building camaraderie among the staff. The children and adults who live at St. Mary's Home qualify for Medicaid (or, for military families, the U.S. Armed Services Tri-Care program), while United Way, grants and individual and corporate donations also help cover the cost of care. Thank you to our many generous supporters, including some who especially stood out in 2010:

- Carl and Carole Anne Albero, who made the lead gift to the adult home at St. Mary's.

Charity house helps brighten St. Mary's Home

St. Mary's Home was honored to have been chosen to benefit from the Charity House at the Tidewater Builders Association's Fall 2010 Homearama. The showcase of homes took place Oct. 16-31 in Norfolk's coastal East Beach community.

Scott Crumley, of Crumley Group, Inc., built the Charity House, dubbed "The St. Mary." Crumley made a generous donation to St. Mary's Home from the proceeds of the sale of the Charity House. The donation is being used to redecorate the children's rooms according to the children's needs and desires.

Proceeds from the sale of the house, plus contributions from the Homearama preview party and staffing of the house with volunteers – both of which St. Mary's coordinated – generated \$78,000 for St. Mary's.

The one-of-a-kind Charity House, a Mediterranean-style Dutch colonial home, was designed by Cox, Kliewer & Company. Professionals from the International Interior Design Association contributed the home's interior design.



Kids helping kids

For the Crumleys of Virginia Beach, helping St. Mary's Home for Disabled Children is a family affair, right down to the youngest member, Jenna.

Last summer, 9-year-old Jenna Crumley watched her father, Scott, build the Homearama Charity House to benefit St. Mary's Home, and her mother, Janette, also get very involved with the project.

And when Jenna took a tour of St. Mary's and met two girls her same age, Jenny and Carrington, as well as other children, she was inspired to start the Kid2Kid program for children from



Hampton Roads to reach out to the children of St. Mary's and grow public awareness about the Home. Jenna has introduced a number of her friends to the children of St. Mary's Home; the group has grown to about 26 boys and girls.

Kid2Kid is helping the children of St. Mary's form new relationships and participate in more activities with other children in the community, from having a tea party to joining together for a "Chalk the Walk"



event on Sept. 26, 2010, to decorating the school bus entrance at St. Mary's.

The children of Kid2Kid also have donated art supplies and party materials to the children of St. Mary's and sold lemonade and crafts. One girl asked guests to bring donations to St. Mary's instead of gifts to her birthday party. So far, Kid2Kid members have raised

more than \$2,300 for St. Mary's, while making new friends.

Embracing a new option for adult care

Where do the children go after they turn 21? People often ask that when they learn that the residents of St. Mary's must find other places, such as nursing homes, to live when they reach that age.

Moving away from the comfortable environment and caring, expert staff they have known can be difficult for the young adults and their families.

Now, St. Mary's Home is expanding to provide them another option.

Since late 2010, generous supporters have contributed more than \$2.3 million of the \$3 million needed to build a wing to care for adults, including St. Mary's own graduates. The expansion, designed by PF&A Design, will feature 12 private rooms and is expected to open in 2012.

Carl and Carole Anne Albero made the lead gift. Carl Albero is a St. Mary's trustee, founder of defense contracting company AMSEC and vice-chairman of the Board of Directors of Colonna's Shipyard; Carole Anne Albero is a retired special education teacher, St. Mary's volunteer and member of St. Mary's Auxiliary Board.

Other major supporters include The Hampton Roads Community Foundation, St. Mary's Auxiliary Board, Sentara Healthcare, Amerigroup Charitable Foundation, the Napolitano Family Foundation, TowneBank Foundation, Beazley Foundation, Douglas and Marianne Dickerson Foundation, Steve and Mara Frederickson, Chester F. Giermak, John and Joyce Fain, John "Dubby" and Susan Wynne, a number of St. Mary's employees and all of St. Mary's trustees and campaign cabinet members. 




